Desc. Popular street guide In 1908, a draftsman named Frank E. Gallup moved to Kansas City from Nebraska to start a career in map making. In 1912, Gallup got a job working for the city engineer. At night he worked for Berry Map Co., a respected mapmaker in the Shukert building at 1113-1119 Grand Blvd. Two years later, Gallup purchased Berry and changed the name to Gallup Map and Supply. In 1919, Gallup issued the first street guide to Kansas City under its name, although the Berry company had been producing them for some time. Every three or four years, Gallup updated the pamphlet, which grew fatter as the city spread out. The guide was less detailed than an atlas, but it could lead you to any address in the city.
